### 12TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - 4TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Today's Gospel reading for the 12th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Mark's account of Jesus calming the storm, is one of the greatest, if briefest, miracles recounted in Mark's Gospel. While the winds and waters of the storm are crashing against their boat, the disciples fear for their lives, confused by the calm with which Christ faces their impending doom. After commanding the storm to cease, Christ delivers one of the greatest rebukes in all of scripture: "Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?"

Why are we afraid? In our confusing lives today, it is easy to forget that the fundamental root to many of our fears is a lack of faith. This connection is so fundamental that Christ offers no alternative cause to their fears; to our Savior, the relationship is absolute. We might have orthodoxy, we might have beautiful liturgies, strong and healthy families, unwavering convictions, and many other testaments to our faith. But if our faith is insufficient to conquer fear, that potent weapon of the enemy, we have much work to do.

And it is important to distinguish between the rational fears which are necessary to our survival, and the irrational fears which we inflict upon ourselves. It is natural for us to have a fear of hunger and thirst, violence and danger. But the hypothetical and speculative fears which we create for ourselves serve only to draw us away from the Son of God. He is with us here today, in His Holy Church, in the same manner that He was with the disciples.

The calming of the storm contains another vital detail, which can be easily overlooked. It was Christ who suggested that He and the disciples cross to the other side of the Sea of Galilee. In His infinite wisdom, the coming of the storm was known to Him; yet He still brought the disciples out into the sea. Perhaps the events we encounter today are also planned and known, perhaps Christ's unfathomable power can calm the storms of our lives, and perhaps the Savior's rebuke applies to our current interior lives.



### A COMMENTARY FOR THE 12TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

#### <u>BE NOT AFRAID</u>

Our commitment to Christ will be put to the test.

We will hear whispered warnings and denunciations, as Jeremiah does in today's First Reading. Even so-called friends will try to trap and trip us up.

For His sake we will bear insults and be made outcasts—even in our own homes, we hear in today's Psalm.

As Jeremiah tells us, we must expect that God will challenge our faith in Him, and probe our minds and hearts, to test the depths of our love.

"Do not be afraid," Jesus assures us three times in today's Gospel.

Though He may permit us to suffer for our faith, our Father will never forget or abandon us. As Jesus assures us today, everything unfolds in His providence, under His watchful gaze—even the falling of the tiniest sparrow to the ground. Each one of us is precious to Him.

Steadfast in this faith, we must resist the tactics of Satan. He is the enemy who seeks the ruin of our soul in Gehenna, or hell.

We are to seek God, as the Psalmist says. Zeal for the Lord's house, for the heavenly kingdom of the Father, should consume us, as it consumed Jesus (see John 2:17). As Jesus bore the insults of those who blasphemed God, so should we (see Romans 15:3).

By the gracious gift of Himself, Jesus bore the transgressions of the world, Paul tells us in today's Epistle. In rising from the dead, He has shown us that God rescues the life of the poor, that He does not spurn His own when they are in distress. In His great mercy, He will turn toward us, as well. He will deliver us from the power of the wicked.

That is why we proclaim His name from the housetops, as Jesus tells us. That is why we sing praise and offer thanksgiving in every Eucharist. We are confident in Jesus' promise—that we who declare our faith in Him before others will be remembered before our heavenly Father.

# Saint Irenaeus, Bishop and Martyr

We know very little about the life of St. Irenaeus, who is one of the most important theologians of the 2nd century. He was born about 130 in Asia Minor and placed in the care of St. Polycarp, the disciple of St. John the Apostle, and Bishop of Smyrna. He studied in Rome and later became a priest of Lyons in Gaul. In 178, he succeeded St. Pothinus as Bishop of Lyons.

Through his preaching Irenaeus converted many to the faith, and his writing did much to combat the heresies that were rampant, especially, those of the Gnostics and Valentinians. His thought, overwhelmingly Biblical in inspiration, is at once simple, vigorous, and profound. Opposed to the dualism of Gnosticism, it is characterized by a single vision: universal recapitulation in Christ.

Irenaeus's principal works are: Against Heresies and The Proof of the Apostolic Preaching. Accordingly, he is regarded as a link between the East and West. He died a martyr in 202 during the persecution of Septimus Severus.

PRAYER: God, You enabled St. Irenaeus, Your Bishop, to strengthen the truth of faith and the peace of the Church. Through his intercession may we be renewed in faith and love, and always strive to foster unity and concord. Amen.



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
